Vocabulary	
city	Place where people live and work that is larger or more important than a town
road	Piece of ground leading from one place to another, often with a surface for vehicles
river	Large, natural stream of water flowing in a channel to the sea or another river
village	Rural area made up of houses.
town	Smaller than a city and larger than a village.
environmental regions	Area with a unique climate and vegetation
physical charac- teristics	Natural features of an area, such as mountains and rivers
human charac- teristics	features of an area that have been built by people
county	Divide countries into small areas
region	Area broadly separated from others by its physical characteristics
topographical features	Natural or man-made feature
hamlet	Settlement smaller than a village

## Human Geography

The branch of geography that looks at how and where people live, as well as where and why human activities are found where they are.

## Physical Geography

The branch of geography that looks at natural features of the earth's surface such as landforms, drainage features, climates, soils and vegetation.
