## Dear

We understand that there are barriers to children attending school and we want to work with our families to identify and remove any barriers, as well as having a good understanding of any medical needs that affect regular attendance.

As part of this work, we have written to you previously, highlighting that your child's attendance had slipped below 92% and to offer you support.

Currently, x's attendance is x%, this is a significant concern, and your child is now considered to be persistently absent.

We now need to meet to discuss a plan of action for improving attendance. If targets are not met after an agreed period of monitoring consideration will be given to Voluntary Parenting Contract and referrals to the EWO for penalty notices or enforcement.

Attendance percentages can be misleading. For some parents, 90% attendance may seem like an acceptable level of attendance.

However, the reality is that 90% attendance is equivalent to missing **half a day of school each week** or 19 days of school during the school year. That is nearly four school weeks.

The table below shows the amount of lost learning a child may have by missing school.

90% attendance	Nineteen days of absence across the year; three weeks and four
	days of learning missed
85% attendance	Twenty-eight days of absence across the year: five weeks and
	three days of learning missed.
80% attendance	Thirty-eight days of absence across the year: seven weeks and 3
	days of learning missed.
75% attendance	Forty-six days of absence across the year: nine weeks and one
	day of learning missed.
